Unemployment Insurance (UI)

UI benefits provide a temporary, partial wage replacement to workers whose hours have been greatly reduced, or who are unemployed, through no fault of their own.

Dislocated Worker Services

Dislocated Worker services are designed to help workers who lost a job through no fault of their own have been laid off get back to work as quickly as possible. Recently expanded eligibility means more Minnesotans than ever qualify for these services.

If you are eligible for Dislocated Worker services, you may receive:

- » Career planning and counseling
- » Counselor-approved training
- » Job search and placement services
- » Resources to support your job search
- » Resources to start or grow a business through CLIMB

Veterans Employment Services

Current or former military members, no matter era of service, receive priority services in all CareerForce locations. In addition, specially trained Veterans Employment Representatives assist veterans who have been recently discharged or left active duty; or have challenges finding or keeping a job; or have a service-connected disability.

Youth Employment and Training Programs

A variety of programs are available to help youth who come from low-income families, have difficult barriers to employment, and are at the greatest risk of suffering serious setbacks in life without extra help and professional guidance. These programs are designed to help at-risk teens and young adults find jobs, build job skills, learn specific trades, and explore education, training, and career options.

Minnesota Family Investment Program (MFIP)

MFIP and the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) Program offer employment-related services for clients making the transition from public assistance to work.

Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)

SNAP provides food support to adults between the ages of 18 and 50 who do not receive other cash assistance with services and who must comply with work requirements by participating in work or work-related activities.

MN Family Resiliency Partnership (MFRP)

MFRP, also known as the Displaced Homemaker Program (DHP), helps individuals who have worked primarily as an unpaid caregiver for home and family develop the marketable skills to find and maintain a job.

Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP)

This progran provides paid part-time community service assignments for people 55 years or older who are low income. Community service assignments are used as training opportunities to gain marketable employment skills.

State Services for the Blind (SSB)

SSB provides the tools, training and technology to help people who are blind, visually impaired, DeafBlind or experiencing vision loss to live independently and to prepare for, find and keep a job.

Vocational Rehabilitation (VR) Services

Our VR Services unit can help persons with disabilities prepare for, find and keep a job, and live as independently as possible.

Work Opportunity Tax Credit (WOTC)

WOTC is a federal tax credit available to all private-sector businesses as an incentive to employers to hire workers in certain groups who consistently experience high rates of unemployment. Employers, not job seekers, apply for this tax credit. However, it is useful for job seekers to know about WOTC, since they can bring it to the attention of a potential employer.

Minnesota Federal Bonding Program

Sometimes employers are reluctant to hire workers they view as risky, such as someone with a record of arrest, a history of drug or alcohol abuse, suitable employment history or other reasons. Bonding is no-cost employee insurance that protects employers against employee theft of money or property. Employers, not job seekers, apply for these bonds. However, it is useful for job seekers to know about the program, since they can bring the bonds to the attention of a potential employer.

Adult Basic Education (ABE)

Adult Basic Education (ABE) is available at little to no cost to adult learners throughout the state. ABE services include Adult Diploma, High School Equivalency (General Educational Development (GED) and High School Equivalency Test (HiSET), English as a Second Language (ESL or EL), Career Pathways, Family Literacy, Basic Skills Enhancement, Workplace Literacy, and U.S. Citizenship/Civics.
